in the feminine matrix of sex and gender in classical athens kate gilhuly explores the relationship between the prostitute the wife and the ritual performer in athenian literature she suggests that these three roles formed a symbolic continuum that served as an alternative to a binary conception of gender in classical athens and provided a framework for assessing both masculine and feminine civic behaviour grounded in close readings of four texts against neaira plato s symposium xenophon s symposium and aristophanes lysistrata this book draws upon observations from gender studies and the history of sexuality in ancient greece to illuminate the relevance of these representations of women to civic behaviour pederasty philosophy and politics in these original readings gilhuly casts a new light on the complexity of the classical athenian sex gender system demonstrating how various and even opposing strategies worked together to articulate different facets of the

athenian subject

this tightly focused collection of essays by a distinguished group of scholars analyses the degree to which expressions of emotion in ancient literature and art become an artistic rather than a social construct to what degree do literary genres philosophy and visual arts produce expectations for the arousal of certain emotions are the emotions of women for example represented differently in different genres how and why do literary genres and visual arts concentrate on specific emotions and stylise them accordingly and how do particular emotions relate to gender within literary texts the book will be of interest to all students and scholars of classical literature and gender studies

myths reflect reinforce and sometimes subvert gender ideologies and so have an influence in the real world this is true in the present no less than when the greek and roman myths were created the struggles to redefine gender roles and identities in our own time are inevitably reflected in our interpretations and retellings of these classical myths using the new lenses provided by gender studies and diverse forms of feminism lillian doherty re examines some of the major approaches to myth interpretation in the twentieth century psychological ritualist charter structuralist and folklorist she also explores popular uses of classical mythology from television and comic books to the evocation of goddesses in jungian psychology

recognizing gendered metaphors as literary and ideological tools that biblical and assyrian authors used in the representation of warfare and its aftermath this study compares the gendered literary complexes that authors on both sides of the israelite assyrian encounter developed in order to claim victory the study begins by

identifying and tracing historically the presentation of royal masculinity in assyrian royal texts and reliefs dating from the 9th through 7th centuries bce central to this analysis is the assyrian representation of warfare as a masculine contest in which the enemy male is discredited as a rival through feminization the second part of the study focuses on the biblical authors responses to the assyrian incursion and demonstrates that the dominant metaphorical complex for recording and remembering israel and judah s military encounters with assyria was that of jerusalem as a woman this section therefore traces the evolving canonical biography of jerusalem the woman as her life story is told and remembered in relationship to assyria in the final section of the book the contest of royal masculinity described in royal assyrian texts informs the reading of the redactional history of judah s memory of assyria and the insights gained from the study of a feminized jerusalem are applied to a rereading of the siege scenes of the assyrian palace reliefs innovative in its use of gendered language as the basis for historical comparison of biblical and assyrian texts this book is the first to offer a comprehensive methodology for defining and assessing the impact of gendered language within texts of historically linked cultures this book also advances the discussion of what has been called inner biblical exegesis by offering gendered metaphors as a lens through which to trace the evolution of judean social memory within the biblical text

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
